



and Covid-19 is still with us, after two of the longest years of my life. The newest variant "Omicron" is rampant, so it's back to masking, as well as shutdowns, at least here in Oregon, with hospitalizations and deaths higher than even the Delta surge, or the original. But I'm not really here to write about the pandemic, 'cuz I am bone dead tired of all that, and I'm pretty sure that you, dear reader, are as well.

Instead, I'd like to reflect on why I continue this specific work.

I'll be honest: this issue is an entire year overdue. Our last issue, #38, came out in October of 2020, and then the entire year of 2021 got away from me. Not a day has gone by without one of our patient readers asking: "when will the next issue come out?" On the surface, my current answer to that question is a cheat, because I'm writing this knowing that the issue you are holding in your hands is the next issue. But the question now resets to: "when will issue #40 be out?" (My current answer is, "in the fall.")

More deeply, the answer of "when" is nested inside another question: "why?" This was once a profitable family business but that ended during the Great Recession, and is now a passion project which I pursue between multiple day jobs. So why keep going?

When folks ask me this question, I often respond, "Because I'm too stubborn to quit." But the real answer is less flippant, and closer to the bone: because, in the words of a certain pop culture Pagan, "destiny is all." Doing this, I believe, is why I'm still Pagan, still connected to the Goddess, and still alive and kicking.

Backing up a bit, let me begin by acknowledging one thing: I feel intensely grateful for the support of our readers, writers, artists, and advertisers over the last thirty years that I have been publishing Pagan magazines. I have worked with, quite literally, hundreds, if not thousands, of people in creating these magazines. Starting with SageWoman (in 1986) and continuing with The Green Man, PanGaia, The Blessed Bee, newWitch and now Witches&Pagans, my entire adult life has been interwoven with the literary side of Pagan community.

Ironically, I've only been a member of an active, in-real-life Pagan circle for about five of those years. The other quarter century, I've been a solitary, and a rather low-key one at that. Yes, I have an altar, and our family says a Pagan grace every night before dinner, but most of my Pagan thoughts, ideas, longings, desires, and devotions are poured directly into these magazines. My life purpose is to bring the work of others to fruition, gently nudging, crafting, editing, designing, and encouraging other Pagans to share their inspirations with our communities. It feeds my soul to midwife these amazing voices of our community into the world. And that's why I fight to keep W&P going.

Your cause may (and probably is) different than mine, but when you find your reason for living, I urge you: be stubborn! Stubborness is so needed now. Today's challenges — especially the environmental damage to our ecosphere — may seem overwhelming. In the past, we papered over many of them, but the cost of pushing Earth to her limits is now becoming all too apparent. But it is not than than despair, it is time to dig in.

Hard times make for hard gods and I am witnessing accelerating changes in our many contemporary Pagan cultures. Old ways die, and new are born: I expect us to be called to work harder, and see further, rather than rest on our past accomplishments. Paganism has indeed been reborn in the 20th and 21st centuries, but now comes the time to mature beyond our (relatively) blissful childhoods.

A few decades ago, it was common for us to imagine a mythical golden age — often coded as Anglo-Saxon-Nordic-Celtic white — agrarianism as the source of all Pagan culture. Today, we increasingly realize that our paths must embrace a multi-cultural future, in which no single pantheon, race, or culture dominates Pagan discourse. To thrive in this rapidly evolving world, our challenge is to connect ever more deeply to the landforms and to the cultures in which we actually live today. We must venerate our ancestors, true — but think mostly of our descendants.

Fortunately, we Pagans are nothing if not inventive — and stubborn.

After millennia of cultural domination by Power Over ideologies, we have rediscovered, reinvented, and created new faiths that honor all the living beings of Earth, and the Land itself. Surely we can keep finding new ways to grow, change, and persevere.

Never give up, never surrender, dear ones. May the gods, goddesses, and spirits bless us all. **②**
